ON THE FRONT LINES OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, YUKONERS, WITH THE SPIRIT OF INGENUITY AND GENEROSITY they are well known for, are doing their part to help reduce the spread of the coronavirus in the territory.

Including Village of Mayo Elder and artist Dorothy Profeit, who is championing sewers from the community, including her daughter and long-time Victoria Gold employee Buffy Genier, to create

300 non-medical face masks for the company's employees and

contractors at the Eagle Gold Mine.

According to Canada's Chief Public Health Officer, Dr. Theresa Tam, wearing a non-medical mask can be an additional measure to protect others from the spread of COVID-19 paired with frequent hand washing with warm water and soap for at least 20 seconds and

maintaining a two-metre (six-foot) physical distance from others.

"Victoria continues to meet or exceed regulations established by the Yukon Chief Medical Officer of Health," says Victoria President & CEO John McConnell. "Through our COVID-19 Action Plan, we have instituted strict prevention measures to protect our work force and Yukon residents and communities. These prevention measures have in part, enabled operations at the Eagle Gold Mine to continue, while strongly mitigating the risk of the coronavirus."

Dorothy, a self-taught sewer, learned to design Mother Hubbard parkas through her work at Yukon Native Products over nine years. She has now been sewing for more than three decades and teaches parka-making workshops at Yukon College's Mayo campus in Dawson City. To make the masks, she used a disposable one as a template and collected fabric from community members. According to Buffy, "the nose piece was challenging to figure out and we tried everything. I finally found some prong fasteners, cut the ends off and they work like a charm."

Elastic was also challenging to source in the territory. "We tried everywhere and had people looking all over Canada for us," continues Buffy. "Mom's sister finally found some and it will be here this week so we'll be ready to assemble."
